

Speaker Bios: **Technology Facilitated Gender-Based Violence** (June 2026)

Cailin Crockett is a policy expert advising industry, governments, and non-profit organizations on online safety and AI, with a focus on countering image-based sexual abuse and online threats that disproportionately target women and children.

For more than a decade, she advanced the wellbeing of women and families in the US and globally through public service, holding executive roles at the White House and the Department of Defense. During the Biden-Harris Administration, Cailin was dual-hatted as a Senior Advisor to the White House Gender Policy Council and a Director on the National Security Council, serving as a key advisor on technology safety and accountability as well as AI governance, and overseeing bipartisan reforms to combat sexual violence in the military and counter sexual violence in conflict.

She holds a Masters of Public Health from the Johns Hopkins Bloomberg School of Public Health, where she was a Bloomberg American Health Initiative Fellow focused on violence prevention. Cailin went to UCLA and earned a Master's degree in Political Theory from the University of Oxford. She serves on the Advisory Committee of the Cyber Civil Rights Initiative and on Governor Newsom's Tech Innovation Council. Her research and expertise has been published and referenced by Foreign Policy, Oxford University Press, the World Bank, and the National Academy of Sciences.

Jennifer Landhuis (M.S.) brings nearly 30 years of experience as an educator and advocate on the issues of stalking, domestic violence, and sexual assault to her current position as the Director of the Stalking Prevention, Awareness, and Resource Center (SPARC) and the National Resource Center on Cybercrimes (NRCC). As Director, she oversees the development and implementation of multi-faceted resources, programs, and publications on stalking and tech-facilitated violence, collaborates with national partners, and provides robust trainings to criminal justice and victim service professionals. Jennifer has led the SPARC initiative since its founding at AEquitas in 2018 and the NRCC since its founding in 2025.

Lara Pham serves as the interim executive director at the Cyber Civil Rights Initiative (CCRI). With experience overseeing research, strategic communications, and operations teams, she has led complex policy and advocacy initiatives on counter-extremism, managed multimillion-dollar U.S. and EU grants, and testified before

Congress. Her work has directly impacted government regulations and discourse concerning countering extremism/terrorism online. She has previously worked as a consultant for the UN Foundation, deputy director at the Counter Extremism Project, an analyst at a private investment firm, and an advisor at the U.S. Mission to the United Nations. Lara holds a master's in international affairs from Columbia University and a B.A. from UC San Diego.

Lindsey M. Song, Esq. is the Director of the Technology-Facilitated Abuse Initiative at Sanctuary for Families. In prior roles at Sanctuary, she represented indigent survivors of intimate partner violence in family law proceedings for over ten years. Since 2016, Lindsey has led the New York Cyber Abuse Task Force (NYCATF) as Co-Chair. The NYCATF is a collaboration of agencies, attorneys, and advocates working to end cyber abuse in all its forms, which includes but is not limited to the non-consensual dissemination of sexual images, hacking, stalking, spoofing, harassment, identity theft, impersonation and more.

Lindsey has given hundreds of presentations and trainings around intimate partner violence and technology abuse. She has been invited to speak at the White House, several national conferences, and has been featured in the Atlantic, New York Times, Newsweek, NY Post, BuzzFeed News, and other publications for her work around technology-facilitated gender-based violence.
